The day began on a heartfelt note with the Muskwak Juniors of Kapawe'no Nehiyawak School opening with an honour song, establishing a profound sense of respect and unity among the participants. This powerful introduction set the stage for Fleury's compelling presentation.

Organized by the High Prairie Friendship with leadership from Executive Director Sacha Martens, the event sought to foster community ties and support. Key contributions from Barry Sharkawi, the chair of High Prairie Friendship, ensured the event's success. The gathering was enriched by speeches from Mohamed Sharkawi, a 15-year-old First Nation student, and Darren Martens, an RCMP Officer, who both emphasized the importance of resilience, community and partnering to tackle racism and bullying.





Theo Fleury, formerly a renowned hockey player who played with Calgary, New York and Chicago has reinvented himself as a motivational speaker who inspires audiences by sharing his personal triumphs over addiction and childhood trauma. In his conversation with the students, Fleury spoke candidly about abuse from a former coach, mental health, the journey of healing, and the significance of seeking help. By reflecting on his life experiences, notably from his book "Playing with Fire," he illustrated that hope and transformation are within everyone's reach. Fleury's words resonated deeply, especially as he shared insights into overcoming life's challenges and embracing personal strengths. The connection he established with the students was heartfelt, offering them a sense of hope and the realization that they, too, can overcome adversity. "At Kapawe'no First Nation Collegiate, we are deeply committed to fostering a learning environment that thrives on unity, collaboration, and pimachimowin. Today's gathering with Theo Fleury underscores our dedication to addressing the challenges our students face through partnerships, the power of the land, and the profound lessons embedded in Nehiyawewin", said Boh Kubrakovich-Kiniw.

The event underscored the collective effort to promote healing, support, and empowerment within the community, turning Fleury's visit into a memorable and transformative experience for all involved.

The first day off the 3rd Annual Cultural Days event, themed "Reconnecting Our Spirit," which had taken place from September 22nd, 2024, at the BCN Grounds in Wabasca, Treaty 8 Territory. Hosted by FCSS MD Opportunity No 17 Family and Community Support Services, the event aimed to immerse attendees in Nehiyawak pimachiowin



and being through various activities, performances, and educational opportunities.

Students and staff were invited to meet Knowledge Keepers and engage in a wide range of traditional practices such as moose hide tanning, dry meat making, fry bread making, plant identification, slingshot making, bow/arrow making and art therapy stations.

Later in the week at BCN if you have time to visit will be sessions on traditional tea preparation, pow wow drumming, hand games, medicine walks, fire making, and setting up a trappers tent. Cultural teachings, including Cree language panels and Treaty 8 teachings, will be given, alongside practical sessions like bannock on a stick, birch bark moose caller making, and tipi pole teachings.


Learning Philosophy


Flexible Learning

The school week from September to June is enriched by virtual extensions, engaging students in additional cultural and educational activities. Weekends are dedicated to fun, wellness, and athletics during the sporting periods.

Curriculum at Buffalo Bay Academy

Buffalo Bay Academy is fully accredited by Alberta Education and follows the global standards for instructional time. We offer a minimum of 950 instructional hours for Grades 7-9 and 1,000 hours for Grades 10-12, consistent with Alberta Education standards and Kapawe'no First Nation governance requirements. To enrich these hours, we've incorporated flexible, additional online modules that can be accessed during extended weekends or evenings.

This maintains our alignment with the rigorous learning standards while offering our unique blend of traditional and innovative learning experiences.







Innovative Curriculum Elements

Balance with Technology to Enhance Learning: Education in person or online that finds the balance between meaningful person to person interactions and using technology to improve communication and enhance learning.

Traditional Knowledge Keepers: In addition to in-person teachings, there are also live-streamed sessions where Elders and experts provide real-time learning experiences.



Location

Our school finds its home 3.5 hours north of Edmonton and 2.5 hours east of Grande Prairie, accessible via a paved highway on the northwest shore of Slave Lake, known as Buffalo Bay. The towns of High Prairie and Slave Lake lie in close proximity.

Governance within our Nation

With unwavering support from Hereditary Chief Sydney Lee Halcrow and lifetime Councillor Debbie Chalifoux and Councillor Pamela Halcrow, we operate in alignment with our Nation's Governance Codes and the Sovereign and Inherent Rights of Nehiyawak people.

Nehiyawak Pimachihowin (Way of Life)

A distinctive feature of our institution is the integration of LAWF (Land, Air, Water and Fire) teachings into our instructional programs and



education processes. Nehiyawak teachings hold equal importance alongside Alberta Education coursework, guiding our students on a path of identity discovery and a balanced approach to indigenous and non-indigenous ways of knowing.

Our Nehiyawewin immersion program lays the foundation for the revitalization of our language within our school, Nation, and territory. Our cultural and land-based programs immerse students in the Nehiyawak way of life and ways of knowing. Furthermore, we offer a top-notch Quality Daily Physical Education Program, running in conjunction with our Sports Academy and Indigenous Fine Arts Academy, tailored for students. We firmly believe in achieving academic excellence in harmony with athletic pursuits as a vital aspect of lifelong learning.

Life Long Learning

Our school adheres to Alberta Education's guidelines for instructional hours, ensuring a minimum of 950 hours for elementary and junior high student instruction and 1000 hours of instruction for high school. Our flexible school timetable allows for a four-day school week during the winter months (November to April), providing our students with extended weekends to explore, participate in activities, engage in cultural practices, and build upon traditions.


