

Every day, she, with guidance from Ms. Linda Gladue, teaches her students Nehiyawewin (Cree language) and pimachimowin, emphasizing ancestral ways. Learning the language helps students gain confidence and understand their Nehiyawak identity.

In her classroom, Mrs. Halcrow incorporates stories, songs, and survival skills into the core subjects—reading, writing, math, and art—making learning both engaging and meaningful. the immersion program alive, ensuring that children appreciate and understand where they come from.


### **Learning Philosophy**


### **Flexible Learning**

### Curriculum at Buffalo Bay Academy

Buffalo Bay Academy is fully accredited by Alberta Education and follows the global standards for instructional time. We offer a minimum of 950 instructional hours for Grades 7-9 and 1,000 hours for Grades 10-12, consistent with Alberta Education standards and Kapawe'no First Nation governance requirements. To enrich these hours, we've incorporated flexible, additional online modules that can be accessed during extended weekends or evenings.

This maintains our alignment with the rigorous learning standards while offering our unique blend of traditional and innovative learning experiences.



### Location

Our school finds its home 3.5 hours north of Edmonton and 2.5 hours east of Grande Prairie, accessible via a paved highway on the northwest shore of Slave Lake, known as Buffalo Bay. The towns of High Prairie and Slave Lake lie in close proximity.
