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


Rising Star: Mya McLeod's Artistic Journey at Buffalo Bay Academy

We have two streams in our academy and they are our Grades 7-9 Junior High and 10-12 High School.




Learning Philosophy

To enrich these hours, we've incorporated flexible, additional online modules that can be accessed during extended weekends or evenings.





Overview

Kaskihtayanih at Kapawe'no First Nation is designed to provide flexible learning options for students who need an alternative to traditional classroom settings. It offers two streams known as hybrid: in-person and virtual independent learning. We are a partnership between KFN Wellness Centre and KFN Collegiate which is an Alberta Education accreditation school under number 5.2351.

The in-person stream requires students to attend the school and complete workbooks on-site with direct support from teachers. The virtual independent learning stream allows students to complete their coursework online at their own pace, with teacher assistance available on designated days.

This program ensures personalized and supportive education tailored to meet diverse student needs. Students who struggle with coping skills, attendance concerns, learning challenges; this could be the program to help you achieve your Junior High Grades and high school credits.

For High School programming: the "academic/practical stream" or the "knowledge and employability stream" will determine the program for the student.

Summary of High School Streams:

Academic Stream - Core

The "academic stream" is a specialized core program designed to prepare high school students for success in "college and university." The program offers a rigorous curriculum that emphasizes critical thinking, problem-solving, and advanced academic skills. Students in the academic stream have access to specialized courses, enrichment opportunities, and personalized support to help them achieve their academic goals. By participating in the academic stream, students are equipped with the local knowledge, skills, and confidence needed to excel in college and university programs.

Practical Stream

The "practical stream" is tailored for high school students aspiring to pursue "trade schools and training programs." The program offers a comprehensive curriculum that not only focuses on academic subjects but also incorporates practical skills relevant to various trades. Students in the program have access to specialized courses, hands-on training, and career guidance to prepare them for success in their chosen trade. The program emphasizes the development of technical skills, problemsolving abilities, and work ethic, ensuring that graduates are well-equipped to excel in trade schools and training programs and embark on successful careers in their chosen fields.

*Students who attend the Academic or Practical stream, once students have achieved 100 credits with all the "REQUIRED" courses, will graduate with an Alberta High School Diploma. All students "Credentials" will be confirmed through PASI through Alberta Education that a student has met all the requirements to araduate.

Knowledge and Employability Stream (K&E)

The "Knowledge and Employability Stream"

is specifically designed for high school students with special needs and learning challenges. The program provides a supportive and inclusive learning environment tailored to meet the unique needs of each student. The curriculum focuses on developing essential life and employability skills, such as communication, problemsolving, and teamwork, to help students achieve success in both their personal lives. Through individualized learning plans, small class sizes, and specialized instruction, the Knowledge Employability Stream aims to empower students with the tools and confidence needed to overcome challenges while giving the students the skills needed to lead productive lives.

*Students who attend the Knowledge and Employability Stream, once students have achieved 80 credits with all the required courses, will graduate with an Alberta High School Certificate of Completion.

WHO WE ARE

Under the Kapawe'no First Nation Lifelong Learning, the Kapawe'no First Nation Collegiate comprises four pillar schools, is accredited both in western studies and Nêhiyawak Pimachihowin (way of life). Our programs specialize in Nêhiyawewin (Cree Language) Isihcikewin (to know for yourself) arts, sciences, music, sports and Nêhiyawak studies. With state-of-the-art technology, we build upon the technological advances of Kapawe'no Nêhiyawak School (K-6), Buffalo Bay Academy (7-12), First Nation Virtual Learning Centre (FNVLC) and Kapawe'no Kaskitayanih (Ka Skih Tah Ya Nih) (Outreach/Adult Learning).

The 5 W's are: awina (Who), kikwiy (What), tanti (Where), taniki (Why), and tanspi (When). These words help us understand stories, answer questions, and find out details about different topics.

By using these questions, you can gather important information and understand things better. Let's explore how these simple but powerful words can help you learn and share new information in everyday life!

- awina (ah wee nah) who awina (ah wee nah) who is it?
- awina kiya (ah wee nah kee yah) who are you awinki (ah wee ni key) who are they? kikwaya (key kwiy ah) - what is it?
- kikwiy (key kwiy) what
- kikwiy kitotin (key kwiy kih toh teen) what are you doing taniki (tahn knee kih) - why
- tanikohk (tahn ih kohk) when will it happen tanimaykohk (tahn my kohk) - when is it happening
- tanisi isnakoso kona (tan si isna koh soh koo nah) what color is the snow? tanspi (tan spee) - when did it happen
- tanti (tan tee) where


