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Highlights from Professional Development with Staff: Inspiration from former Olympian Brian Thomas

Kapawe'no First Nation - On day two, Mr. Brian Thomas, a former Olympian and our current Athletic Director, discussed the core mission of our Sports Academy and attracting more students; balancing academics and athletics. Under the Kapawe'no First Nation Lifelong Learning, the Kapawe'no First Nation Collegiate comprises four pillar schools, is accredited both in western studies and Nêhiyawak Pimachihowin (way of life). Our programs specialize in Nêhiyawewin (Cree Language) Isihcikewin (to know for yourself) arts, sciences, music, sports and Nêhiyawak studies. With state-of-the-art technology, we build upon the technological advances of Kapawe'no Nêhiyawak School (K-6), Buffalo Bay Academy (7-12), First Nation Virtual Learning Centre (FNVLC) and Kapawe'no Kaskitayanih (Ka Skih Tah Ya Nih) (Outreach/Adult Learning).

LOCATION

Nestled within the ancestral lands of the Kapawe'no First Nation, the First Nation Collegiate stands alongside Buffalo Bay connecting the waters of the Lesser Slave Lake 29 km away from High Prairie and along side the Hamlet of Grouard.

Our 7 Sacred Grandmother / Grandfather teachings are; Sakihitowin (Love), Manacihtowin (respect), Sohkitehewin (Courage), Kwayaskitatsowin (Honesty), lyinisiwin(Wisdom) Tapahteyimisowin (Humility) and Tapwewin (Truth)

UNIQUE FEATURES

FLEXIBLE LEARNING

Miskwami Mitawiwin (hockey) Canada's national sport, engages students in teamwork, health, and confidence through weekly sessions supported by donated equipment. Metawewin (lacrosse) combines traditional practices with modern gameplay, encouraging students to set goals and enhance their skills. And the many other sports we have such as basketball, volleyball, soccer and baseball.

Mr. Thomas also mentioned the team supporting this mission, including Mr. Sandy Laughlin, who focuses on dryland training and goal setting, and Mr Sergiy Ivanyuk, who manage hockey development and program logistics. Mr Rod Sutherland has been multitasking efforts that have contributed to the Academy's success.



Additionally, initiatives like the anti-bullying policy, the student-athlete program, and intramural play during lunch hours play vital roles in fostering a positive environment. Mr. Thomas emphasized that achieving a balance between academics and athletics prepares students to excel in sports while pursuing their educational aspirations and dreams.

Kapawe'no First Nation - Teachers at Kapawe'no Nêhiyawak School and Buffalo Bay Academy are taking proactive steps to further integrate nêhiyawêwin into their teaching practices. During lunch, they dedicate time to learn on their own, focusing on strategies to enhance the language experience for their students. This ongoing professional development reflects their commitment to nêhiyawak pimachimowin.

The KFN Collegiate schools have been participating in Nêhiyawêwin Isihcikewin (Online) and classroom learning from Ms. Linda Gladue for three years now. Recently, the teachers have added to their learning by joining the Nêhiyawêwin Circle hosted by our Superintendent with Ms. Gladue, Mrs. Charlene Noskey and Mr. Glady Anderson, where they learn to incorporate nêhiyawêwin into the four core subjects throughout the school day.



This initiative aligns with the mission and vision outlined in "The Renewed Heartbeat of Kapawe'no Nêhiyawak". The roadmap

emphasizes the need to reclaim and revitalize nêhiyawêwin, ensuring it remains a solid part of the nation.

Location

Our school finds its home 3.5 hours north of Edmonton and 2.5 hours east of Grande Prairie, accessible via a paved highway on the northwest shore of Slave Lake, known as Buffalo Bay. The towns of High Prairie and Slave Lake lie in close proximity.

Governance within our Nation

With unwavering support from Hereditary Chief Sydney Lee Halcrow and lifetime Councillor Debbie Chalifoux and Councillor Pamela Halcrow, we operate in alignment with our Nation's Governance Codes and the Sovereign and Inherent Rights of Nehiyawak people.

Nehiyawak Pimachihowin (Way of Life)

A distinctive feature of our institution is the integration of LAWF (Land, Air, Water and Fire) teachings into our instructional programs and



education processes. Nehiyawak teachings hold equal importance alongside Alberta Education coursework, guiding our students on a path of identity discovery and a balanced approach to indigenous and non-indigenous ways of knowing.

Our Nehiyawewin immersion program lays the foundation for the revitalization of our language within our school, Nation, and territory. Our cultural and land-based programs immerse students in the Nehiyawak way of life and ways of knowing. Furthermore, we offer a top-notch Quality Daily Physical Education Program, running in conjunction with our Sports Academy and Indigenous Fine Arts Academy, tailored for students. We firmly believe in achieving academic excellence in harmony with athletic pursuits as a vital aspect of lifelong learning.

Life Long Learning

We have two streams in our academy and they are our Grades 7-9 Junior High and 10-12 High School.

Curriculum at Buffalo Bay Academy

Buffalo Bay Academy is fully accredited by Alberta Education and follows the global standards for instructional time. We offer a minimum of 950 instructional hours for Grades 7-9 and 1,000 hours for Grades 10-12, consistent with Alberta Education standards and Kapawe'no First Nation governance requirements. To enrich these hours, we've incorporated flexible, additional online modules that can be accessed during extended weekends or evenings.

This maintains our alignment with the rigorous learning standards while offering our unique blend of traditional and innovative learning experiences.







Innovative Curriculum Elements

Balance with Technology to Enhance Learning: Education in person or online that finds the balance between meaningful person to person interactions and using technology to improve communication and enhance learning.

Traditional Knowledge Keepers: In addition to in-person teachings, there are also live-streamed sessions where Elders and experts provide real-time learning experiences.

We have Kapawe'no Kaskihtayanih: Innovative Learning for Diverse Student Needs

Kapawe'no First Nation through the KFN Collegiate has launched the Kapawe'no Kaskhtayanih, formerly known as Outreach/Adult Learning, aimed at providing flexible educational options for students in grades 7-12. With the Alberta Education School number S.2351, the program caters to students seeking alternatives to traditional classroom settings. The program features two distinct learning streams: in-person (April 2025) and virtual independent learning, ensuring that educational pathways align with individual needs and circumstances.

The in-person stream (April 2025) will invite students to attend classes on-site, where they can work on assignments with direct teacher support. Conversely, the virtual independent learning stream offers greater freedom, allowing students to study and complete coursework online at their own pace, with assistance from educators available on specified days. This blend of learning formats ensures that students who face challenges such as attendance issues, coping difficulties, or learning obstacles can find a supportive environment to succeed.

The Kaskihtayanih program also provides tailored high school courses through three streams: Academic, Practical, and Knowledge and Employability, along with a variety of electives. The Academic stream is specifically designed for students aiming for higher education, offering a challenging curriculum focused on critical thinking and advanced





skills. By addressing the unique needs of junior high and high school students, Kapawe'no Kaskihtayanih is committed to fostering an inclusive and enriching educational experience that empowers students to achieve their academic and career goals.
