While it's an achievement that 3 out of the 5 teams brought home medals, the true essence of the tournament was found in the friendships made, family moments, and the passion for hockey that brought everyone together. For 35 years, this event has been a cornerstone for First Nation sports, celebrating unity and excellence in Native hockey across Alberta.

U11 Team: Foundation of Fun and Growth

- The U11 squad embraced the balance of life long learning and fun. Facing well established teams, they experienced losses against Paddle Prairie (10-0) and Alexandra Braves (9-1) but celebrated a thrilling win with a score of 4-3. They wrapped up their journey against Siksika Braves with spirit, despite the 11-1 outcome. The growth was incredible, especially for players who started the season using chairs for support.

U13 Female: Determination to grow – Displaying resilience, the U13 Girls battled through initial setbacks against Saddle Lake (8-1), Siksika (10-0), and Edmonton Hurricanes (10-0). They bounced back with a 6-3 victory against a team from Edmonton but concluded with a challenging game against Swan River Selects (10-0). Their determination and team spirit were front and center throughout the weekend.

U15 Elite: Bronze Medal Triumph – In a dramatic showdown for the Bronze match up, having a solid 5-1 record, the U15 Elite faced Sunchild. After a nail-biting game, extended into a shootout, Matthias Willier stepped up to secure a decisive 5-4 victory and help to bring home a Bronze medal.

U18 B Team: Silver Medal Journey – After an impressive 5-0 run before the final game,

the U18 B team encountered a closely fought match against Alexander Braves. The match ended in a 3-2 loss, earning them the Silver in the Eagle Bracket of the top U18 B Division.

The Kapawe'no Muskwak showcased strong offensive play and solid defense, with goalie Ryker Halcrow securing the win through a commendable performance.







Alberta Native Hockey Championships 2025: Kapawe'no Muskwak U15 Elite Triumphs Over Edmonton Voyagers Canada

Edmonton, Treaty 6 Territory - At the 2025 Alberta Native Hockey Championships in Edmonton, the Kapawe'no Muskwak U15 Elite faced off in Game 2 against Edmonton Voyagers Canada on Friday, April 4 at the Bill Hunter Arena. Following three days of tryouts across Edmonton, Calgary, and North Battleford, over 250 kids competed, with the team heading to Germany to represent Canada's First Nations.

The game started with Edmonton Voyagers Canada scoring first, taking an early lead with a nice shot off the rush. However, the Muskwak quickly equalized with a great passing play



within 30 seconds, never trailing again. The speed and strategic play had them chasing the Muskwak relentlessly, culminating in a 2-1 lead. In the second period, the Muskwak quick footwork drew a penalty, and the powerplay capitalized, increasing the lead to 3-1. Despite Canada's pressure in the third period, the stellar defense and goaltending of the Muskwak kept them at bay.

The persistent efforts forced another penalty, and the powerplay struck again, making it 4-1. Edmonton Voyagers Canada managed a late goal, bringing it to 4-2.

"Demonstrating true grit and skill, we closed out the game, even against their pulled goalie in a last-ditch effort.", said Coach Ross Willier.

Under the Kapawe'no First Nation Lifelong Learning, the Kapawe'no First Nation Collegiate comprises four pillar schools, is accredited both in western studies and Nêhiyawak Pimachihowin (way of life). Our programs specialize in Nêhiyawewin (Cree Language) Isihcikewin (to know for yourself) arts, sciences, music, sports and Nêhiyawak studies. With state-of-the-art technology, we build upon the technological advances of Kapawe'no Nêhiyawak School (K-7), Buffalo Bay Academy (8-12), First Nation Virtual Learning Centre (FNVLC) and Kapawe'no Kaskitayanih (Ka Skih Tah Ya Nih) (Outreach/Adult Learning).
